I. The Definition of the Church

- A. Origin of the word "church"
 - 1. The **English** word "church" comes from the Greek word "kuriakon"

I Cor. 11:20, Rev. 1:10

- a. "Kuriakon" means "belonging to the Lord"
- b. It was used by the Greek Christians to designate the meeting place for the church.
- 2. The primary Greek word for the church is "ecclesia":
 - a. ek <u>out of</u> kaleo <u>to call</u>
 - b. It denotes a **group** or **assembly** of persons called out, selected, chosen and separated from a larger, more general group of people.
 - c. As adapted by Christianity it designates an assembly <u>called</u> out from the <u>world</u>
- B. Uses of the word "ecclesia"
 - 1. The word *ecclesia* is found **115** times in the New Testament.
 - 2. 110 times the word refers to the church.
 - 3. 3 times it refers to a gathered assembly of **heathen** Acts 19:32, 39, 41
 - 4. 2 times it is used in a Jewish sense as applied to ancient **Israel** as God's assembled, chosen people. Acts 7:38, Heb. 2:12
 - 5. 90 times *ecclesia* is used to refer to the **local** church.
 - 6. The **Gospels** use the word "church" only 3 times.
- II. The Nature of the Church (Figures and Metaphors)
 - A. Words used for members of the church.

 - a. The **foundation**
 - 1) Built by the apostles on **Jesus Christ** I Cor. 3:10,11
 - 2) The Apostles and prophets are those who <u>laid</u> the foundation in the <u>Word</u> of God. Eph. 2:20
 - b. The **cornerstone** is Jesus. Eph. 2:20-21
 - c. The stones or building blocks are **believers** I Pet. 2:5
 - Lithos = worked stones (I Pt. 2:5) Sunarmologeo = to fit closely together
 - 3. The **Bride** of Christ.
 - a. Teaches the love of the **Bridegroom** (Christ). Eph. 5:22-23
 - b. Teaches the submission of the **bride** (the church). Eph. 5:24
 - c. Illustrates the present commitment and the future **relationship**
 - 1) The church is **presented** as betrothed. II Cor. 11:2
 - 2) The marriage will occur in heaven after the <u>rapture</u> Rev. 19:7-9 (*The Rapture is pictured as part of the marriage ceremony. Mt. 25:1-13, Jn 14:1-2*)
 - 4. The Flock Jn 10:16, Acts 20:28, I Pet. 5:2-4
 - a. The flock is **believers**
 - b. The **Chief** Shepherd is Christ.
 - c. The under shepherds are the elders (Pastors)
 - 5. The Vine and the branches Jn. 15.

- III. The Distinctiveness of the Church

 - B. The church has a distinct time: Pentecost to the **rapture** Mt. 16:18, Eph. 1:10
 - C. The church is distinct from the **kingdom** Acts 1:6-7, 11

 - A. A local church is a **group** of professing believers in Christ who have been baptized and have **organized** for the purpose of doing God's will.
 - B. Evidences of organization

D. **Government** of the church

- 1. Wrong forms of church government
 - a. **Episcopal** form of government
 - 1) Hierarchy of **Bishops** and other church leaders
 - 2) Examples.- Catholic, Angelican, Episcopalian, Methodist
 - b. **Presbytarian** form of government
 - 1) <u>Committees</u> of church leaders and laymen run the church. Often have Elders
 - 2) Examples Lutheran, UCC
 - **Demominational** organization

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2. <u>Congregational</u> form of government

- a. Theistic <u>democracy</u> The authority of the church rests in the members of the church as led by the Holy Spirit.
 - 1) *Indigenous;* each church is self-**governing** self-supporting and self-propagating
 - 2) Autonomous; each local church has the right or power of self government
- b. Biblical **basis** of Congregational church government
 - 1) Christ is the only **head** of the church as a whole
 - 2) The **Pastor** is the under-shepherd. I Pe. 5:2, Acts 20:28
 - a) The pastor is to **rule** I Tim. 5:17, Heb. 13:17
 - b) To lead by **example** I Tim. 4:12-16
 - c) The deacons are not a governing board, but **servants** Acts 6:2-5
 - 3) Each member is **equally** indwelt by the Holy Spirit. I Cor. 6:19
 - 4) Each individual believer is a **priest** (I Pet. 2:5,9) before God and has **direct** access to God through Christ. Heb. 10:19-22
 - 5) God gave <u>authority</u> to the believers gathered in His name. Mt. 18:18-20
- c. Biblical evidence of congregational church government
 - 1) The church chooses it's **officers** Acts 6:3-5
 - 2) The church is responsible for correct doctrine and **practice** I John 4:1, I Thess. 5:21, I Cor. 11:18, 23

4. Conclusion:

- a. No detailed legalistic organizational pattern is demanded in the New Testament for the local church, but it is clear that churches are to have an orderly, congregational form of church government independent of outside control.
- b. The state requires that the church, as a legal entity, have an organizational structure of membership, decision making and business practices. These requirements are within the states' authority (Rom. 13:1) and should be followed by the church as long as they do not contradict God's Word. (Acts 5:29)

- c. Deacon's qualifications. I Tim. 3:6-13

- 4) Do you understand that the Deacon's ministry is that of service and counsel to the body of Christ, not authority?
- 5) Are you prepared to submit yourself first to the Lord, then to His people, and finally to the Pastor and other leaders with whom you will work?
- 6) Do you support the local church with at least a tithe (10%) and Missions offering (at least 10% of your tithe)?
- 7) Do you agree with the tenets of faith and governing principles and practices of this church? Is there any areawhich you disagree with or have a problem?
- 8) Do you live a life that is consistent with the Word of God as pertains to morality, conversation, life-style, and appearance? Is there any specific habit or practice in your life that may bring offense to the Gospel or this Church?
- 9) Do you conduct your home life in a way that meets with the demands of scripture? Is there any problem with your relationship with your wife or children that would affect your testimony in the church?
- 10) Are you committed to the soul-winning/visitation program of the church? Are you and will you continue to be actively involved in these weekly outreach?
- 11) Do you have a problem with changing any area of your life, if asked to, in order to serve in this position?
- 12) Are you committed to being at all regularly scheduled services and activities of the church, unless providentially hindered?
- 13) If chosen, will you serve as a deacon in an attitude of love, unity, and faith?

VII. The Ordinances of the Church

A. Definitions

1. Sacrement

- a. Derived from the Latin *sacramentum* which was applied to anything <u>sacred</u>
- b. The word has the idea of a magical conferral of **grace** to the participant.

2. Ordinance

- a. Derived from the Latin *ordo* meaning <u>ordered</u>
- Ordinances emphasis the fact that the rights of Baptism and the Lord's Supper were
 ordered by the Lord.
- c. The emphasis is an obedience to the practicing of these ordinances as a **remembrance**
- d. Sacraments practiced in some churches include: Baptism (infant), communion, marriage
- e. Practice of the Lord's supper
 - 1) As oft as you **will**. I Co. 11:26
 - 2) Who can participate? I Co.11:27-32
 - 3) Open, closed or **close**

B. Baptism

- Christian baptism finds its precedent in the <u>Jewish</u> proselyte baptism and the Baptism of <u>John</u>
- 2. Christian Baptism was not just an extension of these. Acts 19:1-5
- 3. Evidences for the necessity of Baptism
 - a. **Commanded** by Christ Mt 28:19-20
 - b. Christ's **example** to us Mt 3:13-17
 - c. **Practiced** by New Testament Christians Acts 2:38, 41; 8:12
 - d. **Explained** in the Epistles Rm 6:3-5, Col 2:12
- 4. The meaning of Baptism
 - a. Threefold picture Rom. 6:3-5, Col. 2:12
 - 1) Past Christ's death, burial, and **ressurection**
 - 2) Present My salvation



- 3) Future Resurrection of our **body**
- b. Pictures our <u>unity</u> in the body. I Cor. 12:12-13
- First step of **obedience** I Pet. 3:21
- Is baptism necessary for salvation?
 - Baptism is a work (Eph. 2:8-9)

 - Lord's Supper -- I Cor. 11:20

 - Breaking of **bread** -- Acts 2:42, 20:7 d.
 - Lord's **table** -- I Cor. 10:21

c. A reminder for personal judgment and **confession** by the believer.

- 4. The efficacy of the Lord's Supper
 - a. Non-Baptist views
 - 1) Transubstantiation (Romanism) The bread changes to the actual **body** of Christ, and the wine to the actual **blood** of Christ.
 - Consubstantiation (Lutheranism) Omnipresence of body and blood are placed upon the bread and wine giving it sacramental value.
 - 3) Spiritual Presence (Reformed) Christ is present in a special way **grace** is received.
 - b. Baptist view
 - 1) No grace is **magically** or **supernaturally** conveyed in any way.
 - 2) Blessings, that come from this act of obedience:
 - a) Remembrance of what Christ did for us
 - b) Close **fellowship** with Christ
 - c) Close fellowship with other **Christians**
 - d) Assurance of salvation
 - e) Anticipation of the **second** coming
- 5. Participants of the Lord's Supper
 - a. Believers Acts 2:41-42. Closed, open & close
 - b. **Examined** and found in right relationship with Christ (including **Baptism** by immersion) -- I Cor. 11:28-32
 - c. **Assembled** church members
- 6. **Procedure** for the Lord's Supper. I Cor. 11
 - a. Prayer of thanksgiving over the elements.
 - b. The distribution of the bread and cup to all.
 - c. The recalling of the words of Jesus explaining the bread and cup as representative of His body and blood in sacrifice for His people and inviting them to "take" and "eat".

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- d. Eating and drinking the elements.
- e. The person who should administer the Lord's Supper is not mentioned, but would normally be the leader of the church.

7. **Elements** for the Lord's Supper

- a. Bread and wine (cup) are the two elements.
- b. The emphasis in Scripture is not on the nature of the bread and wine, but rather upon their symbolic significance.
- 8. **Frequency** of observance of the Lord's Supper.
 - a. No specific direction is given in the New Testament. "As oft as ye..."
 - b. It is implied that it was done regularly and frequently in the early church

WHAT IS A BAPTIST?

I. Baptists

A. Baptists are not **Protestants**

- 1. Protestants began with the *protests* of the excesses of the Catholic church during the <u>reformation</u>. (1500's)
- 2. Baptists were originally called AnaBaptist or <u>rebaptizers</u> because of their requirement for baptism after salvation.
- 3. Most church historians trace a "Baptist" church back to the **first** century. (*Montanists*, *Novatians*, *Donatists*, *Waldensians*)
- 4. Baptists do not have a **human** founder.
- 5. Baptists have historically held to and fought for freedom of **religion** for everyone.

B. Baptists are **Bible** believers

- 1. Place a strong emphasis on **doctrine**
- 2. Practice individual <u>liberty</u> and responsibility.
- 3. Form **independent** local churches.
- 4. Live **seperated** lives.

 $\underline{\mathbf{B}}$ iblical authority in all matters of faith and practice. - We do not need visions, new revelations, tongues, or any other extra Biblical "messages from God." We just need to study and know the Revelation that He has already given.

<u>A</u>utonomy or self-governing power of the local church. - Our church is completely self-governed outside of any denominational organization. We operate as a church body as led by the Holy Spirit.

Priesthood of believers. - Every believer has equal and instant access to God. There is only one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus.

 $\underline{\mathbf{T}}$ wo ordinances. - We practice two simple ordinances. - Baptism and the Lord's Supper. These ordinances have no part in salvation and only serve as pictures and reminders of what Christ did for us.

Individual Soul Liberty. - Every man, woman, and child must choose personally to come to Christ for salvation through His shed blood.

Security of the believer. - Salvation is a gift form God that cannot be taken away. Nothing can separate the believer from eternal life in Christ and he can have full assurance of Heaven as his future home.

 $\underline{\mathbf{T}}$ wo offices within the local church. - Our Church has two Biblical offices of leadership - Pastors and Deacons. It is the responsibility of the Pastor to serve the church by leading, teaching, and overseeing the church. It is the responsibility of the deacons to serve the church family through assisting with care and provision for special needs.

Separation of church and state. - The state should have no power to intervene in the free expression of religious liberty. Separation doesn't mean that Christians should not influence the state but that the church should not control the state nor should the state control the church.

- * Any church that practices and believes these things is still Baptist by another name.

 - 6) "Freer religious dialogue and cooperation with Evangelicals, <u>Catholics</u> and even non-Christians."
 - 7) "Increasing friendliness to modern science and mounting acceptance of Theistic **evolution** in some form."

HOW TO FIND A CHURCH

- 1. Look for identifying words in their advertising.
 - a. **Independent** Some denominational churches will be independent in their beliefs and practices.
 - b. **Fundamental or Biblicist** You want a church that takes a strong stand on the fundamentals of the faith and is not ashamed to do so.
 - c. **Bible believing and/or Bible preaching -** Is their emphasis on the Word of God and not a creed or covenant or man's wisdom?
 - d. **Baptist** You want a church that is Baptist in polity if not in name also. Many "Bible" churches are also Baptistic.
 - e. Use caution with churches that have unusual names (i.e. City of Refuge, Church of Perfect Liberty) as these are usually charismatic.
 - f. Independent churches that are non-denominational may be good, but churches that identify themselves as interdenominational usually are not.
 - g. Watch out for catch-phrases like "spirit-filled", "Kingdom of God", "Charismatic", "Worship or praise music", etc.

 - a. Doctrinal Statement
 - b. Constitution
 - c. Programs Soul winning, strong missions, Bible teaching
 - d. Promotional literature What do they emphasize? How do they identify themselves?
 - Do not look for an Ohana twin!

 - a. What Bible(s) do you use in your services?
 - b. What colleges do you promote? *Pensacola Christian (PCC), West Coast (WCBC), Ambassador (ABC), Heartland Baptist College (HBC)*
 - c. What mission boards do you work with? BIMI, BMM, WWNTBM, GFA, BWE
 - d. Name some Evangelists that you have had. Ron Comfort, Paul Schwanke, Rich Touzer
 - e. What is the purpose of your church? *Glorify God, evangelism, edifying or teaching, fellowship, testimony, worship.*
- 4. What to look for in a church.
 - a. Strong Bible emphasis.
 - b. Evangelistic outreach.
 - c. Missions emphasis.
 - d. Attendance ratio between Sunday School/Sunday Morning/Sunday Evening and Midweek.
 - e. Pastor led with active deacons, not Board run.
 - f. Who or what is honored.

- g. Friendliness with emphasis on fellowship and accountability.
- h. Active prayer ministry.
- i. Obvious standards of personal separation and holiness, especially in the leadership
- j. A unity of purpose in the church.
